



TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL ATWS MEETING A GREAT SUCCESS

The Twenty-Third Annual Meeting of the Association of Third World Studies (ATWS), Inc., the largest organization of its kind in the world, was held in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, November 20-22. The conclave featured 27 panels and round tables which focused on the theme, “Globalization, Privatization, and Neo-Liberalism in the Contemporary Third World.”

The conference was co-sponsored by ATWS, Georgia Southwestern State University, and Mississippi State University.

Michael Hall, Ph.D., program chair, and then Vice-President/President-Elect, and Gary Kline, Ph.D., ATWS Treasurer, were commended and congratulated for the successful conference they conceived, organized and implemented.

The Keynote Banquet Address, “Juan Bosch: The Construction of Dominican Democracy,” was presented by Matias Bosch, grandson of the ex-Dominican President Juan Bosch, who is Sub-Director of Fundacion Juan Bosch in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. Michael R. Hall, Ph.D., associate professor of history at Armstrong Atlantic State University, gave the presidential address, “The Transition from Democracy to Dictatorship in the Dominican Republic.”

The prestigious ATWS “Presidential Award” for 2005 was presented to Dorothea A.L. Martin, Ph.D., professor of history and a noted expert on China, who teaches at Appalachian State University, “In Recognition of Her Outstanding Contributions to the Promotion of Scholarship Devoted to the Third World.”

Additionally several awards were presented to recognize individuals who have made significant scholarly contributions to the academic discipline of Third World studies. The winner of the “Lawrence Dunbar Reddick Memorial Scholarship Award,” for the best article published on Africa in the year 2004 issues of *Journal of Third World Studies (JTWS)*, was Eghosa E. Osaghae, Ph.D., professor of political science, and Director of the Center for Peace and Conflict Studies at the University of Ibaden in Nigeria, for his outstanding article, “Political Transitions and Ethnic Conflict in Africa,” which appeared in Volume 21, No. 1, Spring, 2004 issue of JTWS.

The winner of the “Cecil B. Currey ATWS Book Award,” presented to the author of the best book published by a ATWS member during 2004, was Toyin Falola, Ph.D., prolific world-renowned Nigerian scholar, who is The Frances Higginbotham Nalle Centennial Professor of History at the University of Texas Austin, for his superlative study, “Economic Reforms and Modernization in Nigeria, 1945-1965,” published by Kent State University Press in 2004.

The “Harold Isaacs Graduate Student Award,” given to the author of the top graduate student paper presented at the annual ATWS meeting, was presented to Nathaniel Kwabo, American University, for his paper, “Failure of Post-1997 Peace-Building in Liberia: Lessons Learned and Challenges for Building Sustainable Peace.”

Superlative Dominican folklore, music, and dance presentation were a highlight of the opening reception and the banquet.

Newly elected ATWS officers are: Michael R. Hall, President; Emmanuel I Udogu, Ph.D., professor of political science, Appalachian State University, Vice-President/President-Elect; and Virginia Leonard, Ph.D., professor of history, Western Illinois University, Executive Council.

The Twenty-Fourth ATWS meeting, which will center on the theme “Transnational Challenges: Environment, Security and Integration in the Third World,” will be held November 2-4, 2006 at Winston-Salem State University.

During the Fall semester seminars were held on “Rethinking Foreign Policy: Russia and the Third World in the Post-Soviet Era,” and “Public Health Problems and Issues in the Third World.” Spring semester programs included “Struggles of Third World Women,” “Is the 21st Century China’s Century,?” and “Historical and Contemporary Issues in Third World Education and Development.” Large numbers of students and faculty continue to attend and participate in the forums which are taped by the Instructional Technology Center at GSW and shown to the community on GSW Channel 16.

From the President's Desk

I would like to thank everyone who made the 23rd Annual Meeting of the Association of Third World Studies in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic a success. I am very grateful to the staff of the Hotel Santo Domingo, especially catering director Andry Calderon, who made us feel welcome in the Dominican Republic. Over one hundred people attended the conference, which was held from 20 to 22 November 2005.

The Keynote Banquet Address by Matias Bosch, the grandson of former Dominican President Juan Bosch (1963), was entitled "Juan Bosch: The Construction of Dominican Democracy." My presidential address was entitled "The Transition from Dictatorship to Democracy in the Dominican Republic." Both talks will be printed in the Spring 2006 edition of the *Journal of Third World Studies*.

The conference's theme—Globalization, Privatization, and Neo-Liberalism in the Contemporary Third World—was obvious in the twenty-seven panels that reflected scholarship from all areas of the Third World. I was quite pleased to see graduate students presenting their scholarship at the conference. I hope members can encourage more graduate students to join the Association of Third World Studies in the future. That way our association can continue to grow.

At the Executive Council meeting on 22 November, we discussed a number of important issues—in addition to the more mundane—concerning the management of the association. Given the success of the overseas conferences in Costa Rica, Taiwan, and the Dominican Republic, we felt that an effort should be made to hold the conference in the Third World more frequently. Possible locations for conferences in the near future include: Argentina, hosted by Patricia Moral; and Brazil, hosted by Jose da Cruz. Members of the association with connections in Third World countries are encouraged to submit proposals for future conference sites. We also discussed the importance of recruitment...both into the organization itself and for service on the Executive Council. It was pointed out that our organization would be strengthened if every member would recruit one new member. In addition, we agreed that current members should be encouraged to serve on the Executive Council.

I am looking forward to the 24th Annual Meeting of the Association of Third World Studies to be held at Winston-Salem State University in North Carolina. Please submit your paper and/or panel proposals and conference registration checks to Ike Odogu, our current Vice President/President-Elect, on time.

I wish all members a healthy and prosperous academic year. I look forward to seeing everyone next November. Please encourage your colleagues and graduate students to join ATWS and present their scholarship at our annual meetings. As President during the 2005-2006 year, I look forward to working with you. THE ATWS ANNOUNCES THE 2006 HAROLD ISAACS AWARD COMPETITION FOR GRADUATE STUDENTS

At its 2001 meeting the Association of Third World Studies (ATWS) instituted The Harold Isaacs Award competition for graduate students in honor of its founding president. Its aim is to encourage and support high quality research and writing among graduate students who have an interest in Third World studies. The Award will be made to the top graduate student paper to be presented at the annual meeting of the Association. All candidates MUST have their papers accepted for presentation at the meeting in order to be eligible for the competition AND they must be present at the 2005 ATWS meeting to deliver their paper. The winner will be presented with a \$400 check award at the annual meeting's banquet. Other selected graduate student papers will also be presented with Certificates of Excellence.

Interested graduate students must submit papers that 1) demonstrate originality in terms of research area and/or interpretation, 2) contribute to the intellectual debates within the subject area in which they are framed, and 3) present well-substantiated arguments. Please note that submissions should be near ready for publication. The winning paper will be published in the *Journal of Third World Studies* after any revisions suggested by the Review Subcommittee.

The selection procedure is as follows: students will submit abstracts of their papers according to established procedures of the Association (see General Call for Papers below). Upon acceptance for presentation at the meeting, the student must send an electronic copy of the **completed paper** to the Education Committee Chair, Dr. S. Lily Mendoza, e-mail lmendoza@du.edu. The deadline for receipt of the papers is 1 AUGUST, 2006. Dr. Mendoza and two other ATWS members will compose the Graduate Student Award Selection Subcommittee.

MEMBER'S CORNER

Professor Chaitram Singh reporting that University Press of the South has announced the publication of the *Flour Convoy*, a novel by Chaitram Singh, professor of Government and International Studies at Berry College, and a former officer in the Guyana Defense Force. Set in Guyana the early 1980s, the *Flour Convoy* follows the struggle of an army captain to free himself from the web of smuggling and ballot tampering with which he has become ensnared. The novel presents a graphic view of the role of the military in the buttressing an authoritarian regime and attempts to disentangle the strands of the sordid symbiosis that sustained their mutual survival.

Professor Doyin Coker-Kolo reporting that the local ATWS chapter in Americus recently held a Seminar focusing on the "Struggles of Women in the Third World." Two of the three presenters were ATWS members. The Seminar made the front page of our local newspaper.

Professor Emmanuel Ike Udogu in Spring of 2006 presented a paper, and served as chair and discussant at the European History and Social Science Conference in Amsterdam.

Professor J. Patrice McSherry, associate professor of political science at Long Island University in Brooklyn and director of LIU's Latin American & Caribbean Studies Program, was awarded a Fulbright grant for fieldwork in Uruguay in summer 2005. Her three-month study extended her previous research on the covert repressive program Operation Condor by focusing on the protagonism of the Uruguayan regime of the 1970s in Condor. This is McSherry's second Fulbright; she received one for a year of study in Argentina in 1992. Her new book, *Predatory States: Operation Condor and Covert War in Latin America* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2005), provides a macro analysis of Condor, its structures and operations, and its links to the U.S. security establishment. The book offers the conceptual framework of the parallel state to shed light on Condor, analyzing the ways in which parallel state structures were used to carry out counterinsurgency wars that radically reshaped state and society. McSherry also is Associate Editor for Latin American sections of *JTWS*.

Professor St. John Robinson's book, *Peopling Belize: Chapters in Migration*, was published by the National Institute of Culture and History in Belize. The work addresses issues of several European groups, Chinese and East Indians in their migration to Belize and their gradual assimilation to the dominant creole or mestizo cultures.

CURRENT RESEARCH PROJECT

Co-authoring a book on *Islam, Women's Rights, and Human Rights in Nigeria*

Professor Robert Curry sends his greetings from Bangkok, Thailand where he is teaching an international economics course at the Institute of International Studies of Ramkhamhaeng University. The IIS is the English language component of the RU which, in turn, is the open university system of Thailand. As such it offers opportunities to students who live in remote parts of Thailand and/or are young people whose families have limited access to the funds required to support their university studies. A large percentage of RU's students work and are wholly or partially self-supporting.

The IIS is centered in Bangkok but it offers courses and degree programs throughout the country including at such city sights as Korat, Songkhla/Hat Yai, Chiang Mai, Khon Kaen and elsewhere. BA, MA and doctoral degrees

are offered in Business Administration, Communication Studies, Political Science and Education, The faculty are all Ph.D. holders, they teach concentrated courses over a one month period and they can teach two at a time. Faculty come from the UK, the USA/Canada, Australia/New Zealand and various European countries. All instruction is in English and all theses and dissertations are presented in English to a three person graduate committee. I might add that there is a need for lecturers in economics as well as in the areas cited above.

Its operations are virtually year-round and consequently teaching opportunities turn up regularly. This is my third year teaching at the IIS and similar to other "regular" faculty persons who come here, I enjoy the assignments very much. The terms include an appropriate compensation level along with round trip air transportation, ground transportation and hotel accommodations one or two people. I might add that faculty teach two or three times per week for a six hour day totalling 48 hours per class. This leaves a good bit of time for sightseeing and there's plenty, plenty to see in Thailand, particularly for retired faculty who have some time and energy to spare..

Let me conclude by pointing out that the Institute is directed by Dr. Piboon Puriveth who, after receiving his BA degree locally, went on to complete an MA at Long Beach State University and then a Ph.D. at the University of Wisconsin at Madison in the areas of biology and environmental studies.
